

TD Summer Reading Club 2015 Arnprior Public Library

#### Introduction

The Arnprior Public Library has participated in the TD Summer Reading Club since the program spread beyond the Toronto Public Library. It allows small libraries such as Arnprior to provide quality reading incentive materials while giving us the freedom to implement the program in our own unique ways.



Our approach in using the materials offered by the TDSRC has expanded and evolved through the years. Kids in Arnprior have laughed out loud, travelled through time, blasted off into space and have been adventure bound. It has become such a staple in the community, that some of our earliest participants are excited to now be returning with their own children.

In an effort to inspire as many children as possible to participate in our TDSRC, we made changes that resulted in both increased registration and increased circulation of children's items.

- 12% increase in children's book circulation (9822 vs. 8774 in 2014)
- 27% increase in registration rates (231 vs. 182 in 2014)
- 374% increase in the number of children who reached the milestone of the end of summer extravaganza! (116 vs. 31 in 2014)

We feel that our TDSRC was successful in attracting children to the library. Children were encouraged to visit often and were given the freedom to read whatever was of interest to them.

The opportunity to choose their own reading material is important if children are going to pursue reading as a lifelong recreational activity. Children who struggle with reading may have a difficult time with assigned reading material at school, and we wanted these children to realize that reading can be a fulfilling personal endeavor.

#### Outreach and Promotion

Calendars of our TDSRC events and the "Cootie Catchers" that were provided through the TDSRC were delivered to all local elementary schools and went home in the book bags of children in Junior

Kindergarten through grade 4

Our children's area was decorated with a bulletin board display of posters with details of all of our TDSRC programs.

This large display became a scrapbook of our summer when photographs and crafts from our completed programs were posted on the display.

An online calendar was posted on our library website.

Hard copies of the calendar were available in the library.

Students attending class visits to the library during the months of May and June were told about our plans for the TD Summer Reading Club.

We submitted an article to our local paper, The Arnprior Chronicle Guide, in June to promote our upcoming TDSRC programs (note: item #2)

The "Cootie Catchers" provided by the TDSRC were left in a basket on the circulation desk for patrons to take. They were equally popular with kids and adults.

We used sidewalk chalk just outside the library and festooned the front of the library with balloons to encourage families to come in and register for the TDRSC.






We created a book display directly below the TDSRC Tree House highlighting the books in the "Top Summer Reads for Kids" pamphlet provided by the TDSRC.

### The Programs

Our TDSRC program ran weekdays from July 2 to August 19.

Children always left story times with a book related craft and lots of smiles!



A total of 78 programs were offered, including a BINGO Pizza Party, one-on-one reading with Ottawa Therapy Dogs, Decorate a Book Bag Program and a Toy Hacking Workshop. A full listing of programs is provided on the enclosed calendar.

Our goal this summer was to encourage children to visit the library often and explore our collection.

In previous years library staff would choose a variety books that we designated as the TDSRC selections. The children could choose up to 3 of these books at a time and log them in a log book at the returns desk upon check-in. As kids logged books, they reached goals. For example 40 books logged equaled an invitation to our end of summer party.

This summer we decided to give the kids the freedom to read whatever they wanted and we did not tie the number of books they read to achieving TDSRC goals. Instead we counted the number of visits children made to the library

and used the bookmark we created and the stickers provided by the TDSRC as a way to track visits. Each time a child came to the circulation desk to borrow items on their card, they were given a sticker to apply to their bookmark. Once children had received three stickers, they were given an "I > my library" pin to wear around town. If they were spotted by library staff wearing their pin they were given a coupon to

redeem for a prize from our prize box. Once children had collected eight stickers, they could choose a library book to be affixed with a special name plate in their honour. (Note: item #5)

Ten stickers transformed their bookmark into a ticket for entrance to our end of summer event. On August 19th we hosted a special visit by the Canadian Museum of Science and Technology. (Note: item#6)

116 children moved through six stations including an inflatable planetarium, stomp rocket workshop and messy science room. Children enjoyed lunch at the library and had the opportunity to win a raffle prize.

#### Successes

Two hundred and thirty-one children registered for our TD Summer Reading Club and filled 1419 programming spaces. This participation rate marked a 27% increase over 2014.



During the months of July and August, 9822 items were borrowed from our children's collection, an increase of 12% from 2014 circulation.

Our programs included related stories, activities and crafts and are a fun social event for children. Our programmers encouraged children to explore further reading about the program topics on their own by providing a selection of fiction and non fiction titles.

The pirate themed day saw children so excited to come to the library that they dressed the part!

Each child left with their own pirate puppet to practice their story telling!

Each day our bulletin board scrapbook grew with photos and craft samples.



It was a great way to reach people who may not visit the library!




